## **Principal's Report**

- 1. School Events
- Remembrance Day assembly Nov. 10

    organizing and running the assembly. They did a great informative and respectful presentation.
    We had 3 students present their families involvement in the world wars and what
    Remembrance Day means to them. Our student audience was outstanding in their show of
    respect for Remembrance Day and those presenting.

#### 2. Semester 2 Transition

The final day for Semester 1 classes will be Thursday, January 26th. Friday, January 27<sup>th</sup> is scheduled as a Pro D Day. January 30 and 31<sup>st</sup> are scheduled as "I Days/Transition Days.

We will be running an alternate schedule for January 25<sup>th</sup> and 26<sup>th</sup>. On these days we will be running a 2 hour class in the morning and a 2 hour class in the afternoon. Over the course of both days, all 4 classes will be in session.

The "I Days/Transition Days" provide opportunities for students who are presently not passing to "catch up" on missing assignments or tests and demonstrate their learning of the expected course outcomes. Teachers will be communicating with students and their families if the student is expected to attend

classes on these days. An "I" plan to recover the course will be shared with the student. The "Transition Days" will also be used by staff to prepare for the start of Semester 2 on February 1st.

#### 3. School Safety

On Thursday November 17th, a student witnessed a man displaying lewd behaviour in a path north of Burnsview Secondary, near the end of 77<sup>th</sup> Avenue. They reported the incident immediately to school staff who called the police.

The Delta Police Department responded quickly, however the suspect had left the area. The police have a description of the suspect and canvased the neighbourhood as part of their active investigation into this incident.

This incident is a reminder for all of us to always focus on safety and simple precautions needed when in a public place. We ask that you please remind your child of the following:

- Arrange to walk with a friend to school
- Do not talk to strangers
- If you are approached by a stranger, go to a public place or yell for help
- Tell a trusted adult as soon as possible

#### 4. Here4Peers

Here4Peers is a youth-driven, evidence-based, Mental Health Awareness Program which involves training older grade 10-12 "peers" from high schools to facilitate an interactive workshop to grade 7 classrooms in catchment elementary schools. Presenting in small teams of 3, these specially trained and supported youth workshop facilitators play an integral part in promoting and ensuring the continuum of health across their respective communities. The Here4Peers workshop is a 140 minute workshop designed to complement prescribed learning outcomes from the BC Physical and Health Education "Mental Wellbeing" curriculum, and includes interactive games, multi-media, as well as small and large group discussions in its delivery. As young people often turn to peers first when facing personal challenges, providing a team of trained and supervised "peer" youth facilitators is an intentional way to engage and normalize conversations regarding mental health, as well as support the articulation process as grade 7 students move to high school.

#### The Here4Peers Program Works Two-Fold:

- 1. It provides mental health literacy, awareness and skill building in the community of **grade 7 students** preparing to transition to your high school. Students learn calming skills, resources, where to go for help if they need it, and that it is important to seek out help if they are struggling.
- 2. It provides **grade 10-12 students** with the opportunity to build skills and awareness through being a part of a pro- active team engaging in community service. They gain skills in public speaking, mental health literacy, teamwork, time management, group facilitation while building confidence and volunteer hours.

## **DPAC** update

Delta DPAC meeting November/2022

The meeting was well attended with most of the newly elected school trustees present for a brief meet and greet. The schools have been assigned to the trustees. Since 4 of the 8 trustees are first time appointees it will take a while for them to wet their feet before they can answer all our questions. This is the reason why the meeting was in person and not over Zoom this time

Ms. Masako Gooch is the new trustee for Burnsview Secondary. All the trustees seems enthusiastic about the idea of being invited by their respective schools for a meet and greet at a PAC meeting.

The recent increase in crime, obscene behavior and safety for students walking to schools was addressed by the superintendent. He impressed upon the fact that Delta school district enjoys a very good and healthy relation with the Delta Police Dept.

The ministry of education gave different grading models to schools to work with for a couple of years. This has now come to fruition and will be finalized by January 2023.

The district will come up with more career nights. Parent participation is key to get some guidance through information and through meeting with probable professional interests.

Feedback from Jen Rak and Vijay was provided about the Capacity Cafe and the BCCCPAC summit held earlier in the month. Both were very well received. The parent attendance for the capacity Cafe was low due to a stormy night. There might be an opportunity for the students to attend another Capacity Cafe for the DPAC.

The BCCCPAC summit was attended by the two representatives from Delta. It was a very informative session. The following was shared by the two.

- Workshops for school PACS are run by the BCCCPAC on how to run the PAC and if there are any other suggestions.
- Consent workshop followed by a course is soon to follow at the district level. This will be focused for the grade 11 and 12 level
- Learning outcomes, indigenous issues, health issues faced by students and what needs to be done to resolve these and what needs to be truly done to achieve truth and reconciliation
- SOG: (Sexual orientation and gender identity) information is available for parents and students. This is not a course
- Antiracism strategies are being developed
- The lack of representation of IBPOC
- Volunteer committees are present and new ones can be set up at the provincial level. Any parent can join and initiate changes

November 30th: Family smart event; Speakers will be available to address the mental health support for parents and care givers of the youth under substance abuse. It will be an informative session about the support that is available.

Note: Shareable Zoom accounts are available without time limits. This available through the Delta SD. Parents are welcome to attend the DPac meetings.
